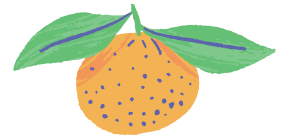

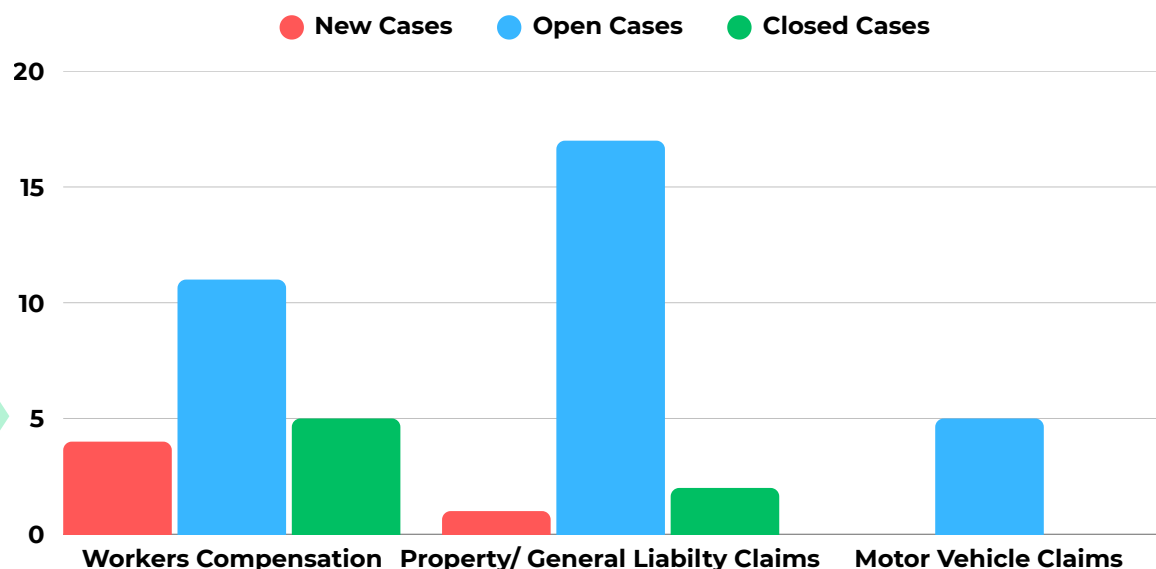

Completed Projects in April

City Hall Broadcast Control Room Cabling Upgrades

- The broadcast control room at City Hall received new wall-mounted monitors and cabling to provide more efficient monitoring of the live meeting broadcasts.
- This allows the AV contractor to better manage meeting operations in the Chambers.

Projects in Progress in April

EOC AV Upgrades

- IT Services staff are working on an audio-video upgrade project for the Fire Operations Command Room in the city's Emergency Operations Center.
- The project includes new voice/data cabling, HDMI cabling, power outlets, and large wall-mounted monitors for displaying County 911 dispatches.
- The project is scheduled for completion in early May.

Employee O.P.T.S. Application

- IT Staff are creating a customized application to assist the various departments with the onboarding & offboarding, promotions and transfer processes of employees.
- The application will be referred to as "**O.P.T.S.**" which stands for **Onboarding-Promotions-Transfers-Separations.**
- This new app integrates with several existing databases to pull information into an online form for dissemination to HR, IT, the requesting department and any other departments needing to know when someone is hired, promoted, etc. The app is a critical piece in allowing IT to maintain proper network credentials, software license compliancy, and asset management.
- Phase 1 of the project includes the Onboarding and Separation modules and is due for testing in May. Phase 2 will include the Promotions and Transfers modules, which are expected to be ready for testing in June.

IT Training for New Hires

- IT staff are building a training curriculum for all new hires that will be accessing the city's voice/data network, city email, and other applications.
- New hires that include Exempt and Non-Exempt full-time & part-time employees, Interns, and Temporary Contract employees will be required to attend the IT training on their first day of employment.
- The curriculum will cover network & application access, setting up email accounts, review of IT usage & security policies, review & assignment of mobile devices, and mandatory cybersecurity training.
- Official training is expected to be ready for new hires starting in June 2026.

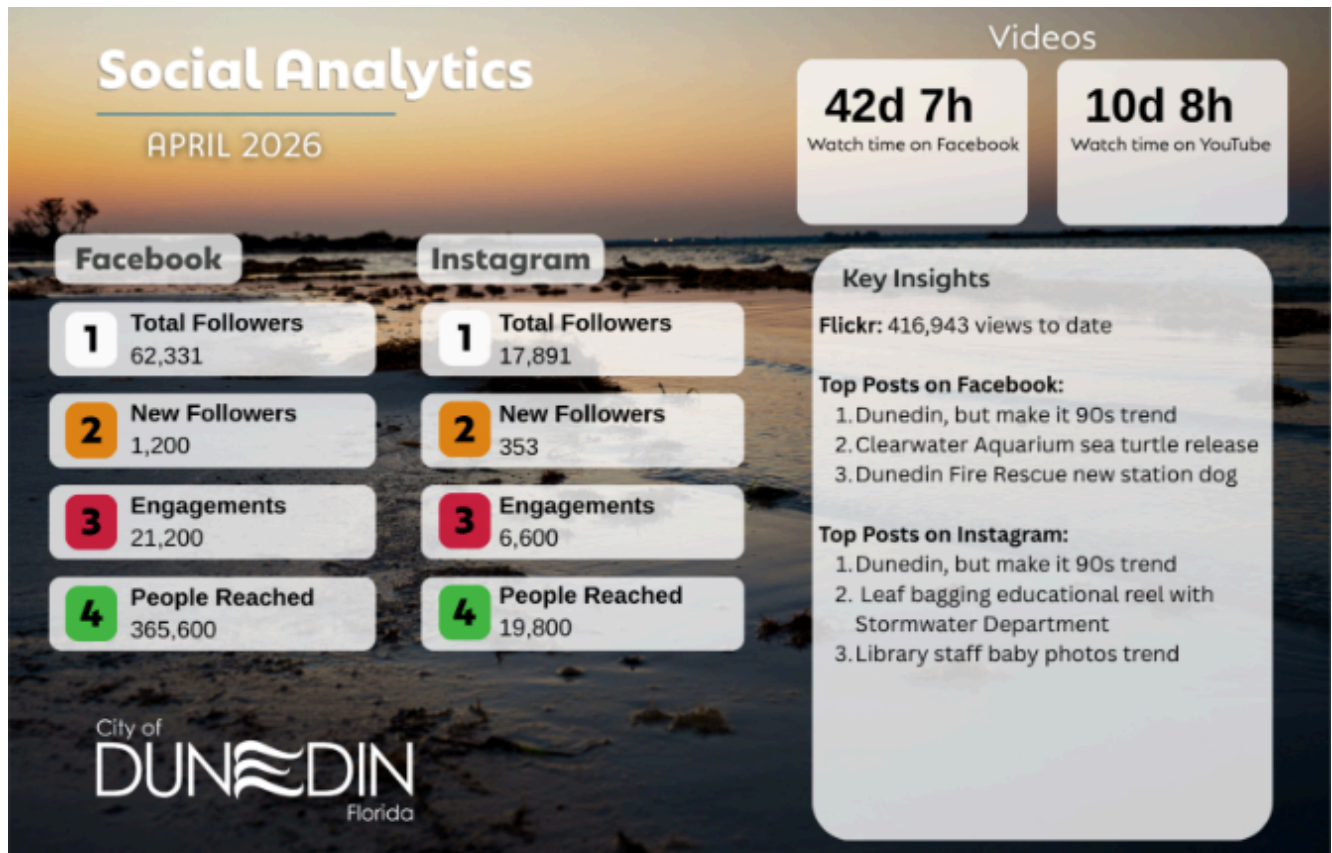
- Demolition of the Dunedin Pier is nearly complete. The contractor will schedule piling replacement and pier construction to begin once the permit has been received from the Army Corps of Engineers.
- Sheet pile installation on the east bulkhead is completed. The crane and accompanying heavy machinery has been relocated to the north bulkhead and repairs are underway.
- Kimley-Horn Engineers and City staff are reviewing and updating the Marina Master Plan.
- The marina basin contains a total of 179 slips. There are currently 32 slips vacancies in varying lengths.
- There are waitlists for all slip sizes with the exception of 25 foot slips.

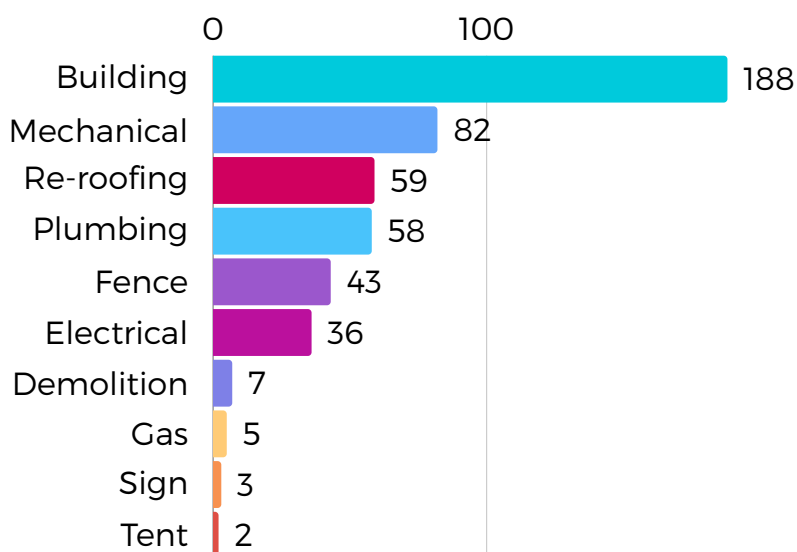

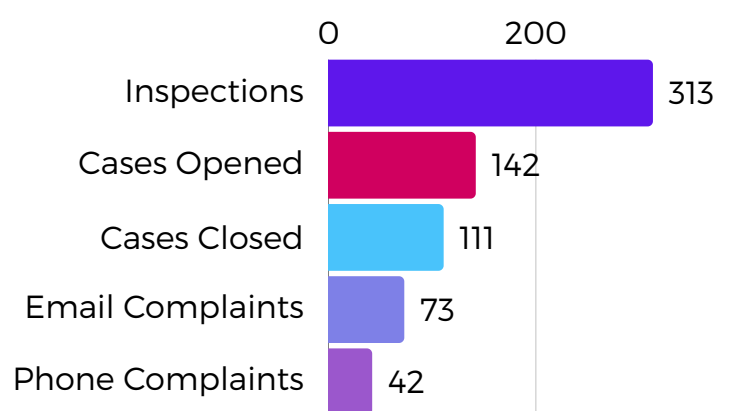

Operations

- Stormwater maintenance repaired 12ft of 10in underdrain pipe along San Salvador with driveway apron and sidewalk replacement.
- Rehabilitation was completed on the restrooms downtown off the Trail on Railroad Ave., next to the Dunedin History Museum bringing them into ADA compliance.
- Replaced all ceiling tiles and insulation at Fire Administration; project completed.
- Savannah Bunch and Laura Valletti, Environmental staff, were awarded scholarships through the Florida chapter of the American Public Works Association (*see kudos page*)
- Environmental staff provided a recycling presentation at the Library for homeschooled students. The session highlighted how participants can be “Eco Recyclers: Heroes for the Earth,” offering an overview of the recycling process and guiding students through a hands-on craft activity using recyclable materials.
- The Pilot program, Food Scrap Track (FST) concluded its third week of collection and continues to demonstrate notable results.
 - Since its launch, the program has successfully diverted **171 pounds** of compostable material from the landfill. 🌱
- Conducted 19 illicit discharge inspections (both proactive and reactive).
- Public Works staff attended the APWA Florida Public Works Expo & Rodeo as both participants and volunteers and provided two presentations on the efficiency recommendation implementation and results with sessions with over 200 attendees from throughout Florida. Two articles have been published on the progress.
- Division staff are updating the Annual Work Plans based on actual work completed in work management (MaintStar) since going “live” in February.

Water Production

- On April 13th Well #89 and #91 began Augmentation to Belcher's reclaim storage tank. To date this year, 5,115,700 gallons of raw water have been redirected to reclaim use.

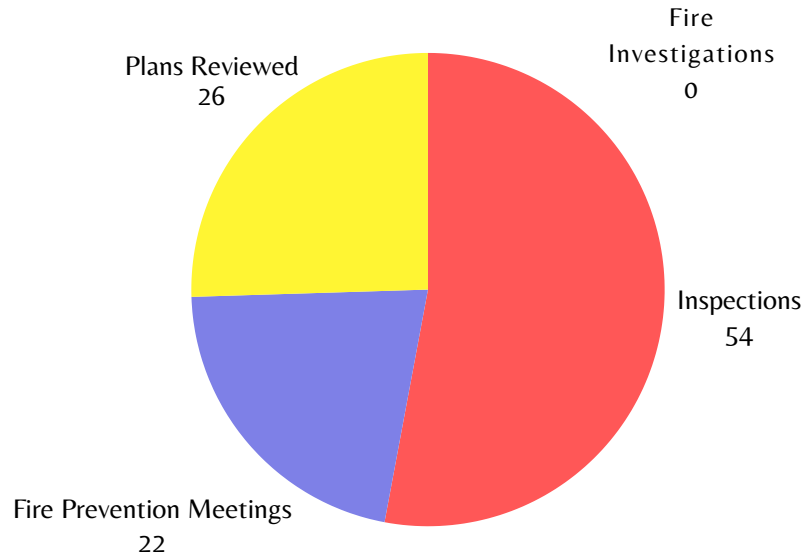

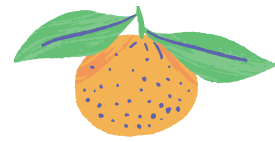

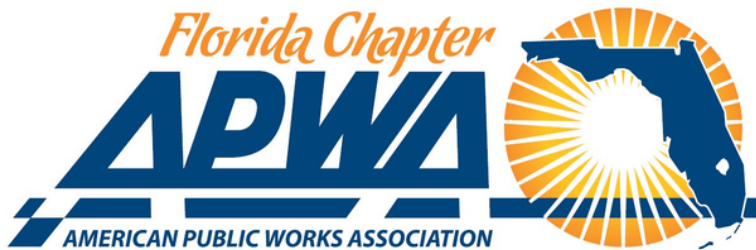

Subject: **Two Dunedin Employees Receive American Public Works Association Scholarships**



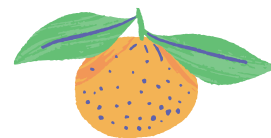
Two City of Dunedin environmental specialists have been awarded scholarships through the Florida Chapter of the **American Public Works Association (APWA)**.

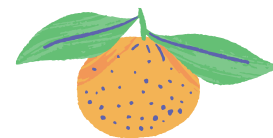

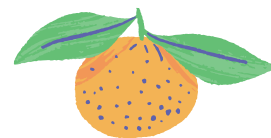
